House Bill 4031 (2021) — Representative Kahle (R)	Violations of Reports of Injuries and Death	As originally written this bill would deny Michigan farm workers working at certain agricultural businesses the same protections that other workers receive when they are injured or die at work. Currently, MIOSHA requires that all employers report all workplace deaths within eight hours and this bill would increase the reporting time to seven days. This not only puts farm workers at risk but also contravenes federal OSHA laws. In addition, the bill would reduce civil penalties for not timely reporting a death or injury of a farmworker from \$10,000.00 to \$500.00, greatly disincentivizing agricultural businesses from alerting MIOSHA of injuries and death on time.
